time. BARN staff and studio leads dived into online class delivery. Thanks to a generous grant from Bainbridge Community Foundation we acquired the cameras, microphones, and other tools needed to offer classes online. On May 23, BARN offered its first online class.

By November, the BARN calendar included online classes in Jewelry, Book Arts, Electronic and Technical Arts, Kitchen Arts, Writing and Woodworking. Even the popular BARN Bazaar moved online, offering items made by BARN members. In all,

BARN offered nearly 200 online events in 2020.

The lemonade that came out of this challenging year is that BARN's online classes attracted students from as far away as New York, Hong Kong and Dublin. Participation is no longer limited by geography. Going forward, online classes will always be an important part of BARN.


